Ossoli President Janie Bitner, First Vice President/President Elect Wanda Taylor and Second Vice President Kim Overman were very fortunate to share the suite of State President Beth Smith . We were busy all three days helping Beth in many ways. Friday activities included the state board meeting in the conference room, Saturday morning, we were up early to run/walk in the Red, White & Blue Run the Bell 5K race sponsored by the GFWC Dickson County Women's Club. Saturday Lunch was an outside Bar-B-Que buffet and a ranger led talk about raptors. Dinner that night was a plated meal and that is where Kim Overman presented the gift bag giveaway. For just \$1, a chance to win a gift bag was possible. It was a fast moving fun time and Ossoli Circle members may participate in one of these events soon. Following the fun, a representative from "Sole for Soles' came to tell us about the progress of the project. Saturday night following dinner, we

drove (Following the Ranger) to an old cemetery on the other side of the park. We learned about the Legend of Hall Springs during the Night Walk & Campfire. Walking through the woods, the ranger told us historical facts about the property in the days when this area was formed by Montgomery Bell, who had one of the largest iron industries in Tennessee. Iron was once thought to be more valuable than gold and was a very lucrative industry at the time.

At the time of the iron industry, the land was stripped of all timber. In the early 1930's three New Deal agencies under the supervision of the National Park Service assisted in the construction of the park: the Public Works Administration, the Works Progress Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corps. The park remained under the National Park Service jurisdiction until 1943, when the original tract of land was deeded to the Tennessee Department of Conservation. At the end of our walk, we were greeted by another Ranger who had prepared a campfire for us complete with some-mores and cold drinks. Everyone is encouraged to attend the Spring meeting in March of 2020.
