

There's a new way to support Smoky Mountain Service Dogs and let fellow motorists know you're doing so!

Smoky Mountain Service Dogs is pre-selling custom license plates to Tennessee residents with registered vehicles. The plate costs \$35.00 but \$15.37 of the cost benefits the organization directly.

The state requires a minimum of 1,000 pre-orders to start production of the new plate. After all orders are received, it will take four to six months for plates to arrive at local county clerk offices. SMSD has been awarded Accreditation by Assistance Dogs International. This validates that the facilities and operation of the SMSD program meets or exceeds ADI standards.





October 12th we met at the Clubhouse and wore purple to remember Domestic Violence Month. The Family Crisis Center, a division of the Helen McNabb Center, presented to us on the current updates regarding Domestic Violence and Tennessee statistics. Tennessee has moved from 5th in the nation to 9th and continues to work to no longer be in the top 10 states with the highest DV rates.
